

Why use the Traffic Incident Management System (TIMS)?

Three injury crashes occur every *minute* in the United States, which translates into nearly 40,000 incident responders being put in harm's way every day. The training brings together police, firefighters, state and local departments of transportation, towing, medical personnel, and other incident responders which leads to an integrated, safer, and faster response team.

Background of Traffic Incident Management (TIM) Online Training

The original in-person training curriculum for TIM was developed through the second Strategic Highway Research Program (SHRP2) and the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), which partnered with the American Association of State Highway & Transportation Officials (AASHTO). SHRP2 research identified the best TIM practices which were then incorporated into the pilot-tested in-person curriculum. This FHWA-led course has since built a team of trainers within each state, region, and/or agency with its innovative curriculum.

But now current conditions have necessitated a certifiable *online training program* that will maintain the integrity of the in-person curriculum. The innovative and comprehensive TIM online curriculum was developed by national recognized trainers with decades of experience and uses a common set of practices and advanced standards across all responder disciplines.

What is included in the TIM Online Training program?

TIM online training incorporates a series of lectures, videos, and quizzes with nine web-based training modules. These self-paced modules offer a level of flexibility to accommodate each individual participant's unique schedule. The nine modules are:

- 3) Notification and Scene Size-Up
- 4) Safe Vehicle Positioning
- 5) Scene Safety
- 6) Command Responsibilities
